> AHSN National emergency laparotomy event update

An emergency laparotomy is a surgical operation used for people with severe abdominal pain to find the cause of the problem and, in many cases, to treat it.

The Eastern Emergency Laparotomy Collaborative (ELC) seeks to share knowledge and ideas for quality improvement in emergency laparotomies and this month we are delighted to welcome new members Bedford Hospital NHS Trust, Ipswich Hospital NHS Trust, James Paget University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, West Suffolk NHS Foundation Trust and Lister Hospital (East and North Hertfordshire NHS Trust). The new members to the collaborative join Addenbrookes Hospital, Norfolk & Norwich University Hospital NHS Foundation Trust and Colchester Hospital.

On the 25th June, the Eastern ELC was represented at the national ELC event by NELA (National Emergency Laparotomy Audit) leads from Colchester, Norfolk and Norwich, Bedford and James Paget Hospitals. It was clear from the event that we have a wealth of experience and ideas for small change improvements within our regional collaborative. And it was the perfect opportunity to introduce our members to our new Regional ELC Clinical Lead, Helen Pardoe.

The event followed our first data submission, using regional aggregated NELA data, into the AHSN dashboard. We look forward to including our latest members' data on the 1st July to build a regional picture, and start the process of comparison and identification of good practice.

Our next focus will be to work with trusts to identify how we can support the implementation of the ELC 6 Step Care Bundle and share the learning. So get your QI thinking caps on and roll up your sleeves. As Professor Rupert Pearse, co-author of the EPOCH paper said during his presentation at the National ELC event: "QI is hard and difficult. The more you can structure it, learn from colleagues who have already done it, the better you get". @ELCsavinglives

Emergency department (ED) checklist - supporting national use

Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital NHS Foundation Trust started a pilot of the ED Safety Checklist in their Minors and Ambulatory Care Unit this month, using the Model for Improvement, and building on lessons learned from University Hospitals Bristol NHS Foundation Trust and West of England Patient Safety Collaborative's ED Safety Checklist Toolkit.

As with any quality improvement project, the question of how to engage staff has come up. Similarly, an interesting article from the BMJ Journal highlights the top 10 challenges with the design and planning of improvement interventions, and it's no shock that communication runs throughout the list.

Tips from Bristol's trial were to keep regular communication throughout the life of the project and not to under-estimate the change management skills needed. Change may be difficult for some, and people will reach different stages at different times. But anything worth doing is never going to be particularly easy, so be patient!


We look forward to seeing the outcomes and learning from Norfolk's pilot.

West Suffolk NHS Foundation Trust (WSH) have also already adopted and implemented the Checklist and, as a paper-light trust, have integrated it within their Electronic Patient Record (EPR). They are now looking at how they can include the checklist as a new way of working, rather than an add-on to routine clinical care. We look forward to working with them to review the data, identify tools to help sustain improvement, and further engage with stakeholders to hold the gain of this improvement project.

New video helps to roll out PReCePT

PReCePT stands for Preventing Cerebral Palsy in Preterm Labour. The project is designed to reduce cerebral palsy in babies by administering magnesium sulphate (MgSO4) to mothers during preterm labour, at a cost of around £1 per individual dose. Preterm birth is the leading cause of brain injury and cerebral palsy, which has a lifelong impact on children and families.


